Timbers is getting a new feeling, a new mystery. There are magnificently bold decorations on nearly every corner featuring couches in lush and smugly they may replace spousal. There are lamps with jeweled bases and curtains, pillows, candles and throwers; somehow Tribeca has become the place to get especially cozy. And as a further accommodation to that well-designed feeling the galleries are increasing.

A new gallery housed in a frairie store is at 41 North Moore Street. Steven Amadee and his euphonious gallery, has taken a small, narrow space and redesigned it so

that it appears nearly talismanic in its open possibilities. The store is where one would take your digital photograph or a photograph that you want to refurbish or preserve.

Magically all the mystery necessary to frame fine photographs rubbed off on Amadee because the three he has mounted this fall were of such finely distilled photographic art that one easily glances while walking in. His current show is called "Ethereal Landscapes" by Ken Wong and to say that these are black and white photographs does them a disservice; they are silver, gray, smoke, moss, stark white, shimmering gold, sepia and soot. The land-

scapes span geography from Butan to Brazil, Yellowstone to Port Tryon Park.

Ken Wong prints his own work and some of the larger pieces are taken from the original work done on a Rolleicord camera from the forties and reduced digitally; these prints are then reprinted on watercolor paper. This result requires a careful eye to discern the image looking for broken strokes because the result is so painterly. The works are, of course, shown exquisitely framed and the prices are quite reasonable making this the place to go for an anniversary or holiday gift when what you are looking to filter is a gift. The show runs until December 31.

Further downtown there is another dual purpose gallery called, "A Taste of Art." It has been at 147 Duane Street for nearly two years and according to the French owner and curator Ms. Laurence Austraf, "I opened at the worst time at the worst spot." I opened in December 2001, near Ground Zero. So it will be two years, we are here now, though, but we are continuing to stay down town."

The gallery has shows of contemporary art with an accent on photography and illustrations. As an aside there is also a small selection of fine chocolates, caviar and a bar.

At the opening this week, of the current

show called FOOD ART there was a bar serving absinthe, sans amaretto, and the art was eclectic. There were hand blown sugar globes in the windows done by Burr Dodd. These other worldly creations capture vision of a candy factory in Venice where the glass and spun sugar mingle. There are large, shiny pastels of hanging Chinese ducks and sandals done by Alison Weirhan and Virginie Sonnet has made collages using mini croissants, multi colored Indian candy featuring the Hindu goddess Lakshmi and a print of a Finch-Oka fruit done in May blossoms and a photograph now掌上明珠 who where dinner guests heads prep through a slide filled with food.

All the artists in the show have a fascination for food, and they all express a vivid creativity through many different mediums. You may leave hungry but you won't be unsatisfied.
